Governors

The Governing Body oversees the work of the School and ensures that the School provides a good quality education for its pupils. The Governors work in partnership with the Head Teacher and other staff and are involved in such matters as:

- Setting the School's aims and policies;
- Improving standards of teaching and achievement;
- Setting the School's budget plan and monitoring expenditure;
- Interviewing and appointing staff;
- Acting as a link between the Local Authority and the School;

Drawing up an action plan after an inspection and monitoring the success of the plan.

The Governing Body consists of one Local Authority Governor, two Parent Governors, one Staff Governor, the Head Teacher and eleven co-opted Governors who are elected for a four year term of office. The Governing Body meets twice a term as does the ancillary committees: Resources Committee (Formerly Finance & Staffing and Premises, Pupil Welfare and Curriculum Committee. The Governors regularly visit the School and observe the work that is being carried out by the staff.

Behaviour; we all have it! We talk about it all the time at school but what do we mean when we say 'behaviour'?

Well, as some of you will know, Mountjoy, alongside the other four TADSS Schools in Dorset (Wyvern, Yewstock, Beaucroft and Westfield) are Therapeutic Thinking





Schools and this informs our practice and policies around supporting and understanding why a particular behaviour might be happening.

Therapeutic Thinking is an approach to behaviour that prioritises giving students and staff positive experiences and feelings, which hopefully leads to positive behaviour. There is strong evidence linking positive experiences and feelings to positive behaviour. We use the term 'prosocial' to describe this.

Many visitors to school comment on how smiley staff and students are and how there is an aura of happiness in school. This is not by chance! All staff work hard to create and maintain positive, trusting relationship with students, so that they feel 'that the sun shines on each and every one of them'

News from the office

What parents/carers need to know about attendance

At Mountjoy School, we believe that education is essential for all. Punctual and regular school attendance promotes social inclusion and effective learning. We believe that children should attend school regularly and punctually because school plays a vital part in their learning and enables them to reach their full potential.



There is strong statistical evidence to show a direct link between attendance and progress children make. Therefore, school does not authorise holidays during term, shopping trips, for example to purchase school shoes, or for leisure days out. Unless there is an exceptional circumstance, pre-planned absences cannot be authorised. Attendance below 90% is particularly harmful to a child's education and will trigger intervention by the local authority.

Where a child is genuinely ill or needs medical treatment, school will be understanding and can provide home-learning for any extended periods. Please keep us informed, including if you are having any issues with school refusal, so we can support you. Current NHS guidance for common childhood illnesses that require children to be kept off can be found here: https://www.nhs.uk/live-well/is-my-child-too-ill-for-school/

FROM THE CLASSES

Hazel Class



The new School year has been very busy for Hazel class, and has started very positively. We are getting used to the new structures and routines in class, and are learning to develop new friendships.

In English, we have spent the last half term thinking about our favourites. We have spent time discussing what we like and the reasons why, and then we have written about them. Hazel class students have very clear ideas about their favourite food, hobbies, colours and TV characters. In Maths,

we are continuing to work steadily through the White Rose Maths curriculum. We have also been completing some Beach School activities focussed on time over a few sessions. We will finish this by going to West Bay to look at shop opening and closing times, how the area is different throughout the day, and completing some beach-based activities. Hazel class have been participating in Forest School sessions every Wednesday afternoon, weather permitting. We have used a PHSE focus to look at how to play games with our

friends, and learning about each other.

In Science, class have been looking at 'Forces'. We have had great fun with magnets, and have also enjoyed riding bikes and scooters in the playground over different surfaces to see which creates



more friction. We have changed topic to 'Light' this half term and have already planted some daffodil bulbs in pots to keep outside of class. We will look at how a plant grows, and how the sun plays an important part in this. Hopefully the daffodils will be ready to take home in early Spring.

Hazel class have enjoyed learning about 'belonging' in Religious Education, with a focus on Hinduism. We have thought about

festivals that we celebrate and enjoy with our families. We have made Diva Lamps from saltdough, and have decorated boxes for a special family member to take home. Hazel class have been fortunate enough to continue to enjoy weekly swimming sessions at our local Aqua Centre. Everyone is very keen to learn, and the enthusiasm and motivation from all is very positive.

It has been a whirlwind start to the Autumn term, and we are very much looking forward to what is coming next.

Elm Class



What a great start it has been for Elm class this term from making new friends, reading stories, art work, numicon and phonics. We have grasped this term with both hands and have made some great memories already!

We started the term by looking at Numicon in maths and learning how to place our numicon in order 1 to 5 and 1 to 10! We also looked at different 3D shapes starting from cylinder, sphere, cuboid and cube!

In phonics we have looked at different letters and have learnt how to write them with chalk, shaving foam and virtually on a board so far we have looked at the letters; m, a, s, d and t.

As a class we also learnt the story of the three little pigs, in art we made straw houses, wood houses and even brick houses! We also had puppets and acted out the story for our own school play in assembly. This was great fun for Elm class!

At the end of October, we had Halloween celebrations starting with dressing up as spooky characters and having a class party as well as sensory play and carving a class pumpkin.

At the start of November; we all made poppies for Remembrance Day with red tissue paper for the flower and black wool for the centre of the poppy. We practiced our cutting skills with a poppy worksheet and picking up items with mini tongs to help with our fine motor skills!

In the next few weeks will be heading to Magdalen farm where we will meet and feed lots of animals as well as planting some plants. We can't wait to tell you all about it in our next newsletter so keep your eyes peeled!

Hello from all in Maple Class!

We have had a busy autumn term and cannot believe that Christmas is fast approaching. 
It has been such a positive start to the school year and from all of us in Juniper, we look forward to what's in store for us next term!






Physical exercise and teaching regulation strategies has been a key focus for us this term and we are already seeing a fantastic increase in the children's mobility, flexibility, balance and confidence. We use the equipment on the field

and the PE apparatus in the hall on a weekly basis and also consistently use our stepping stones, tunnels, balancing sets, bikes and trikes to continue to improve on these skills during the week.



Total communication is of paramount importance for us at



We have introduced Aided Language displays and have been using Grid on the iPad for focused activities such as turn taking, mark making and circle time.







Acorns class is a very explorative and fun environment to be in. We absolutely love our sensory trays and exploration sessions, helping us to work on any

sensitivities the children may have and to encourage giving them the confidence to try new experiences and tastes.



Our Attention Autism sessions have been met with such

enthusiasm and engagement and we are now starting to use similar activities in our lesson inputs such as

exploding lemonade in Science and water balloons and shaving foam snakes in Maths.

Our Science sessions have also been met with lots of interest with the pupils and we are encouraging the pupils to be inquisitive, create chemical reactions with support and begin to get used to hearing scientific vocabulary such as floating and sinking.

Rowan Class

Rowan Class have had a brilliant autumn term and settled really well into their new class and routines.

The rest of the weekly timetable is made up of science, PSHE, RE, geography, ICT and Design technology. We have also introduced an art carousel and a PE carousel on Monday and Friday afternoons. This has proved to be very successful and the students really enjoy interacting with other classes and specialist teachers.

Environment

- Be welcoming
- Be accessible (check lighting, acoustics, temperature, furniture, AAC, visual schedules (I-r), sensory equipment)
- Have zoned areas and a seating plan
- Put up learning support and celebratory displays
- Be tidy, well organised and encourage independence (e.g. labelled resources, coat pegs).

Information

- Display timetables, timings and routines and easily available planning
- Have folders with pupil information (MAPs, pen-portraits, therapy programmes, planning, risk assessments, medical protocols etc.).






Lessons

- · Be well-prepared; planning, resources, symbols all done in advance
- · Have Learning Objectives which are clear and on display
- Include learning to learn, encourage independence, accommodate learning styles, be differentiated and scaffolded, show problem-solving and demonstrations, provide thinking and speaking frames
 - Always have openers, opportunities for varied overlearning and plenaries
- Include plenty of assessment opportunities to inform precision teaching.

Language

- Be therapeutic (use the language of Therapeutic Thinking & Zones of Regulation to help pupils to take ownership)
- . Be positive: point out success, say what you want not what you don't
- · Encourage pupils to know how they are learning
- Be showing consideration to which vocabulary is essential for pupils to learn and ensure they are given lots of opportunity to use it
- Include Signalong and hand gestures to scaffold understanding
- Demonstrate effective questioning to promote good learning.





Remember, children and young people want to do the right thing, especially when they feel part of a team. They thrive on consistency.

Make learning irresistible and encourage them to try new things and to believe that making mistakes is an important way to learn.

We are going to use this generous donation to purchase a Mobii mobile sensory unit.

The Mobii is a self-contained, height adjustable, mobile system designed for floor and table use. It can project a motion-activated interactive surface onto the floor or different sized tables at the touch of a button ready for all ages and abilities to enjoy. It is mobile so it can glide between class rooms.

The system comes pre-loaded with the Sensory Suite, a treasure trove of 300 Activities and games with audio-visual effects designed to stimulate, engage and relax pupils. Staff and students can create their own activities with their own visuals or sounds.

This unit will make a big difference to our pupils, sparking their curiosity to encourage them to interact with their environment in a fun and educational way.

School Council & Pupil Voice



I have a right to relax and play

At Mountjoy we believe that every child and young person has a voice, whether it is verbal or another means of communication. We help children to communicate



because we respect their right to be heard by adults.

School Council meetings are a way for students to tell senior leaders what they think is going well at school, and what could be improved. Any issues which pupils have can be brought up and discussed. Classes elect up to two students to represent them at the half termly meetings.

Our Autumn term meeting was exciting! Shal and Hanna from Dorset Youth Voice very kindly agreed to visit Mountjoy to tell the School Council about what they do for young people in Dorset. One of their current projects is 'Play' and what that means for young people. The School Council reps brought ideas from their class about what they think 'Play' means. They then used symbols to post votes into a ballot box to let Youth Voice know what play is like for them.

The ballot result is: to play inside, with toys and others, in a quiet space sitting down. A lot of students spoke about their favourite things, like their lovely dogs and Roblox.



You Do Music

This term, we have started a new venture in school, in place of the Open Orchestra which ran successfully for two years. Gary Pickard, a local musician, is doing a series of sessions with students, focussed not only on making music together but also on the technical side of recording and mixing music. It has been a variable group of up to twelve young people, and they have enjoyed singing, playing and recording. From this term's work we have a final version of 'Barbie' and 'Last Christmas'. All the students who have taken part in the sessions will receive a CD copy of their work to take home.

Accessible cycling

If you find riding a traditional bike challenging, the Accessible Cycling programme can open up the joy of cycling to you.

We are an accredited Wheels for All Centre operating from the Golf and Activity Centre at Moors Valley Country Park and Weymouth.

Accessible cycling at Moors Valley Country Park

We have a fleet of adaptive bikes to suit a range of needs, from a lack of cycling confidence to physical or mental impairment. These include side-by-sides, recumbent trikes, a wheelchair bike, tag-a-longs, tandems, tricycles and handcycles.



Getting started

All new participants must have a 1-2-1 consultation to get started. This can be carried out with individuals or as a group.

Safeguarding – our highest priority

Gill Howard is our Designated Safeguarding Lead (DSL) in school and she is always available for a chat if you have any concerns. We also have 4 Deputy DSLs, all of whom do Level 3 training regularly, so we are covered at all times with knowledgeable staff. *All* staff complete annual training in Keeping Children Safe in Education and have regular top-ups on specific areas. We also have two online safety champions, Jenny and Iain. If you have any worries, the best thing to do is get in touch and we will help out or sign-post you to the relevant service. If you do not feel able to talk to school, the Dorset Multi-Agency Support Hub can be contacted on 01305 228866.

Private Fostering

Private fostering is the term used when someone who is not a parent or a 'close relative' (e.g., great aunt, cousin, mum's friend or a neighbour) is looking after a child or young person under the age of 16 (under 18 if they are disabled) for 28 days or more in their own home. If this is the case, anyone involved is required by law to notify the local council's Children's Services of the arrangement. A social worker will visit the home to speak to the carer and the child to ensure the child is safe, carry out background checks and make sure support is being provided. Support available for private foster carers may include:

- advice on benefits and possible funding for some essential items
- parenting support and advice

• help in bringing families in crisis back together Consider contacting school and speaking to Gill Howard if you need support in informing the council, or visit the Dorset Council website for more information.
